Excused by the Board of Trustees. 18 Guest: Michael Burr- C.P.A.: School Auditor 19 20 I. 2021-2022 Financial Audit Presentation by Michael Burr, C.P.A.: 21 22 Discussion: Dr. Waite introduced Mr. Burr as the District's auditor who is in attendance to 23 present the 2021-2022 financial audit. 24 25 At this time, Mr. Burr provided the Board with a copy of the Annual Financial Report (audit) for 26 2021-2022 budget year. It was noted an electronic copy of the audit was sent to the Board of 27 Trustees before the meeting for their study of the subject. The following topics were reviewed 28 and discussed: 29 30 Mr. Burr stated the audit process went smoothly and all requested information was 31 provided in a neat and orderly fashion. 32 The Board was directed to pages 10 and 11 of the audit for the Statement of Revenues, 33 Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances as of June 30, 2022 report which included 34 the following discussion items: 35 a. General Fund ending fund balance \$1,741,793 36 b. Food Service ending fund balance \$99,305 37 c. Debt Service ending fund balance \$10,321 38 d. Capital Project ending fund balance \$71,997 39 d. Other Governmental Funds and their fund balances (\$240,917) 40 The ending balance in the General Fund allows for four to five months of operating costs. 41 The Food Service ending balance is partially due to breakfast and lunches being 42 reimbursed at 100% of the federal reimbursement rate during the Covid-19 43 Pandemic funding. As of the 2022-2023 school year the reimbursement rate will revert 44 back to past practices. 45 Governmental Funds include Covid/ESSER funding. The discussion included capital 46 expense purchases and how these items would be discarded through the district's surplus 47 policy. 48 49

 Lack of Segregation of Duties was listed in the <u>Management Letter</u>, but upon further discussion between Mr. Burr, Dr. Waite, and Mrs. Harris, there is no need to reference this item in the future due to the practicing procedures of the district.

At this time Dr. Waite asked if there were further discussions or questions from the Board of Trustees; none were brought forth from those in attendance. The Board of Trustees thanked Mr. Burr for his time in preparing and presenting the audit.

Dr. Waite further discussed the district expenses were \$400,000 less than the reported revenue. Some of the reason is due to salaries being over budgeted by \$36,000 which was a precautionary act by the administration. Also, the budget was based on the student attendance formula but the State Department of Education determined funding would be based on the student enrollment formula for the 2021-2022 school year. Thus creating more revenue than expected. Further discussion took place on enrollment funding vs. attendance funding.

The audit is available to the public through the district office and the official copy will be filed with the minutes of the meeting.

In other Board Work Session items, Principal Chapman was able to assist board members in setting up their <u>Google Classroom</u> account. <u>Google Classroom</u> will be the official board/superintendent correspondence tool.

## Regular Monthly Meeting 7:00 p.m.

## I. Call to Order:

The monthly school board meeting was called to order at 7:04 p.m. by Chair Anthony Bozzuto. Meeting was held in the Shoshone School Art Room (#278) located at 61 East Highway 24, Shoshone, Idaho.

II. Pledge of Allegiance: Chair Bozzuto led the Board and staff in the Pledge of Allegiance.

## III. Consideration of Public Input:

A. <u>Request to Appear</u> before the Board (4105F) was not presented to the board clerk at the time of the meeting.

## IV. Reports:

- A. S.E.A.: No report in October for the S.E.A.
- B. Shoshone Teachers: Mrs. Christiansen reported the elementary staff has been participating in the Cultivating Young Readers training. Teachers are spending time learning techniques and skills in this area. Mrs. Christiansen along with some other elementary teachers are working on starting a blog and podcast.
  - C. Student Body: Mrs. Natalie Olsen and Mrs. Mary Ellen Russell are co-coaches for the Jr. High School Cheer team. They were excited to introduce the team and share their award of first place from a summer cheer camp. The cheer team did a presentation with each member explaining what they liked about being on the team and how it has affected them personally in a positive way. The Board thanked them for the presentation and acknowledged this is the first Jr. High School Cheer team in many years.
  - D. Goals and School Improvement.
    - 1. Carry over, Cafeteria, Handicapped Bus, and Additional State Funding.
  - Dr. Waite reported on the following items:
    - a. Carry over: Dr. Waite addressed the financial carryover of \$1,741,793. Dr. Waite's policy is to have at least 10% carryover for reserve funding. A 20% carryover creates a good financial standing. The district currently has a 38% carryover in the general funding and the amount increases to 48% when adding in the state foundation report. Dr. Waite stated schools have an obligation to spend funds to educate students and the district is at a point to address the carryover during the budget process and planning.
    - b. Cafeteria: Having a positive fund balance will allow the food service to replace a freezer with a larger unit and possibly allow for bonuses for the cafeteria personnel (for those who worked during the time of COVID). Additional discussion took place on the "free lunch for everyone" during the Covid-19 era and how the "free lunch for everyone" federal funding has been removed. Schools are back to the past practices of free or reduced lunches for students that qualify and full-pay for student that do not qualify. There is a program in place at the federal level that if a district is showing a high percentage of low income/poverty it is possible for all students to eat free. Due to the system of calculating for this program, the district does not qualify for this program.
    - c. Handicapped Bus: There is a need in the district to purchase a handicap bus to accommodate students. The district has been researching options and has found a bus for \$20,000. This bus in used and in good condition, but will not meet the requirements to be included in the district deprecation schedule. There will be route created to include handicap student pickups and possibly a few other students
    - d. Additional State Funding: School districts in Idaho have received additional funding in the term of bonus for instructional staff. Dr. Waite would like to follow the strategy of last year's premium pay bonus for staff, and is proposing to include all staff working over 20 hours a week in receiving a bonus. The additional funding amount is \$66,476.05. Including other referenced employees will cost the district an extra \$28,000 but the expense is doable with the current ending fund balance in the General Fund. The proposal is for instructional staff to receive \$1400 and non-instructional staff to receive \$500. In closing, Dr.

35	Vice-Chair Race made a motion to approve the Accounts Payables. Financial Statements and the			

Vice-Chair Race made a motion to approve the Accounts Payables, Financial Statements and the 2021-2022 Audit Report as presented. Trustee Rodriquez seconded.

Discussion: Dr. Waite read the monthly financial re-cap from Business Manager, Shannon Harris.

- This is the first official financial statement of the fiscal year after the audit and all corresponding audit adjustments, including salary/benefit accruals, have been entered.
- The September financial statement reflects the new teaching contracts in place.
- The district's application for federal programs has been approved and reimbursement requests will be made.
- Funds 100521160 and 100521490 are designated for the Cultivating Young Readers grant. These funds will show a negative balance as the grant was received after the budget process. These funds are also grant reimbursement funds.
- Fund 100661330 Tech Fees: is showing over by \$14,648. This is due to an order that had to be made in April and funding wasn't received until October. An adjustment entry to

fund 245 has been made in the amount of \$17,818 and will be reflected in the October Financial Statement.

Dr. Waite further discussed the district audit report and the meaning of "Segregation of Duties" and confirmed with the Board of Trustees that the district indeed does have a "Segregation of Duties" protocol. Protocol is as follows: expense requests are reviewed, purchases orders are issued, the business manager reviews and oversees the fund account numbers, the superintendent reviews the report of expenses, and after the final approval expenses are then paid. In a total three district staff review expenses. After explaining the process to Mr. Burr, Mr. Burr was in agreement that the district does have "Segregation of Duties" in place and future audit reports will reflect this.

Chair Bozzuto stated if there was no more discussion on <u>VI. Financials</u>, called for a vote of all those in favor said aye. All those that oppose say so. Motion carried unanimously.

## VII. Board Business

A. Policies

Policy: 1300: THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: District Policy-Amendment Policy 2540: INSTRUCTION: Selection, Adoption and Removal of Curricular Materials-Amendment.

Vice-Chair Race made a motion to amend policies 1300 and 2540 as presented. Trustee Rodriquez seconded.

Discussion: Dr. Waite explained these two policies reflect state law and read the changes being made.

Policy 1300: Dr. Waite stated the district has and always has had a policy stating the district will follow state and federal laws. Additional discussion took place on federal laws, state laws, administration laws (rules), and structure of policies.

Policy 2540: Dr. Waite stated this policy gives the definition of curriculum and materials and states the superintendent will establish a curriculum adoption committee that will comply with state law.

Chair Bozzuto asked for all those in favor of <u>VII. Board Business: Policies</u>, vote aye and all those that oppose say so. Motion carried unanimously.

## VIII. School Board Training- School Improvement

A. Curriculum Development: Dr. Waite presented a power point titled: *What is "Curriculum?"*. This power point has been added to these minutes as support documentation.

The following points were reviewed by Dr. Waite:




